CMZ Certified as Sensory Inclusive Venue

I am excited to share with you all that CMZoo has officially been certified by KultureCity as a sensory-inclusive venue! Thank you so much to all the staff that took the online training. I know the training was somewhat of an epiphany for many of us!!

The Zoo now has sensory bags, equipped with noise-reducing headphones, widget tools, verbal cue cards, and weighted lap pads, available for guests to borrow at admissions and base. The bags are free to check out. We hold a photo ID when guests check out the bag and return it when the bag is returned at the end of the visit. We have been checking out 2-3 bags per day on busy days!

The Zoo now has designated Quiet Zones to provide a calm and quiet area for visitors with sensory needs. Designated Quiet Zones include the Asiatic black bear viewing area, the elephant demo area (when demos are not scheduled) and the top of Old Gnarly play area between The Loft and My Big Backyard. We have also incorporated Headphone Zone signs to indicate environments with lots of sensory stimuli, in which our guests with sensory needs may want to use their headphones prior to entering. These areas include The Loft, Scutes Family Gallery, and Grizzly Grill.

In support of our inclusivity efforts, the zoo has also installed a universal changing table in the bathroom near the lower-level African lion viewing and the Colobus monkeys! The universal changing table is designed to accommodate individuals with disabilities and assist their caregivers. The table is 6 feet long and can accommodate up to 500 pounds, with features that specifically cater to the diverse needs of individuals with disabilities, such as powered height adjustability.

We are thrilled to be able to provide a safe and sanitary changing environment for all!

Thank you to everyone who participated in the Fall Recall. As of mid-December, 59 participants completed it. The animal knowledge we impart and the relationships we build with guests are crucial to our conservation mission. Additionally, 8 docents took the initiative to certify on the Life Cycle Tour after the November refresher class. By mid-December, 3 docents completed it, and the remaining 5 are diligently working on their quiz and finalizing their tour routes.

Even though most of us have completed our 2 CEC requirement, the spreadsheet shows that around 18 docents still need to meet this goal. There are lots of opportunities in the next couple of months. Make it your goal to complete this requirement soon.






